Our Masonic Journey in the GLSA

The aim of our Grand Lodge is to build a multicultural Brotherhood of good men who practice brotherly love and benevolence and who are united in the enhancement of wisdom, high moral values, equality and justice for all persons. To enable us to achieve this aim, we offer an exciting and enlightening Masonic journey to all our members. You will first through the three foundational indispensable degrees in Craft Freemasonry, being the Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason, and it is internationally accepted that the highest degree in Freemasonry is that of a Master Mason. There are also two Appendant Masonic Orders which we recommend to all of our members to ensure that you attain as complete an understanding of Freemasonry as possible during your lifetime. These are the Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of South Africa and the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite for South Africa.

When you embark on the route through the Royal Arch Order you will learn the significance of Masons' marks in its first degree, being that of Mark Master Mason, which completes the Fellowcraft degree. You will then be advanced to the Excellent Master's degree where you will learn about the journey which the liberated Israelites took from Babylon to Jerusalem to begin rebuilding King Solomon's Temple which had been destroyed by the Babylonians. You will then be exalted in the Royal Arch degree in which you will learn about the discoveries which were made when the rubble was cleared away from the Temple's

ruins. This is generally accepted as the completion of the Master Mason's degree.

Once you have attained the Royal Arch degree, you may join the Cryptic Order and the Royal Ark Mariner Order. The name of the Cryptic Order is derived from the Greek words for the vaults or subterranean rooms which were discovered under King Solomon's Temple and the four degrees in this Order cover a vast and interesting period of time in the Masonic story and explain the essence of the Royal Arch degree. In the Royal Ark Mariner's degree, you are reminded of the story of Noah and the ark which God instructed him to build and the ancient moral and spiritual lessons, which are still applicable today.

Although the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite is an independent Masonic Order, a Supreme Council cannot be established in any country unless it has its own Grand Lodge which supports it. It recognises the supremacy of the Grand Lodge and its aim includes the cultivation and strengthening of the mutual bonds between all internal and external Masonic jurisdictions. It seeks to expand on the Craft degree lessons and assists in the search for mankind's identity and destiny. It encourages the study, promotion and application of the principles of Freemasonry and its historic evolvement and it offers philosophical background which will enhance your understanding of the tenets and teachings of life in general and Freemasonry in particular. It also provides a forum in which you will be encouraged to advance ideas, concepts and proposals which will stimulate research and personal development. The Supreme Council for South Africa consists of Chapters which confer from the 4th to the 18th degrees, Consistories which confer from the 19th to the 32nd degrees and the Supreme Council which confers the 33rd degree. The advancement from the 4th to the 32nd degree will depend on your competence, level of education and commitment to the Order and which is ultimately expressed in the motto Spes mea in Deo est, which means "My hope is in God".

In Proverbs 16:3 we read: Commit to the Lord whatever you do and your plans will succeed. As members of our Grand Lodge and of these Appendant Orders, let us therefore continue in our quest to produce wiser and happier men who will ultimately become better men and thereby assist us to make the World a better place for all persons.

1st Grand Principal Attends Irish Installation

On Tuesday, 24 January 2023 at 19h00, the festivities surrounding the Installation of the new Grand King of the Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Ireland started with a Welcome dinner at Dublin's Freemasons' Hall with most of the heads of the foreign delegations in attendance. Our Grand Chapter was represented by MEC John Smith OSM MSA, while other attendees included MW Bro Douglas Grey (Ireland), MW Bro Peter Lowndes (UGLE) and the representatives from Scotland, France, Netherlands, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Greece and Estonia.

Freemason's Hall is situated near the centre of the city and is an old 3 story building which is kept in very good condition. It has an interesting museum and

dedicated temples for Royal Arch and Mark Master Mason degree workings. At the welcome dinner MEC Smith was seated at the main table with the retiring Grand King,

On Wednesday, 25 January 2023 at 12h00 MEC Smith attended the installation of the new Grand King, MEC Charles Olden. The installation ceremony was held in the main temple of the Grand Lodge and there were about 200 Companions in attendance. The ceremony was much the same as ours, including an opening and a closing hymn. Apart from the SGC Banner, it appears that every Grand King has his own banner and part of the ceremony included the furling of the retiring Grand King's banner and the unfurling of the new Grand King's banner. The retiring Grand King further removes his chain of office and invests the new

Grand King with this chain of office.

After the installation ceremony there was a long lunch in the main dining room with the delegates and partners. Foreign delegates were given the opportunity

to present their gifts to the new Grand King. MEC John Smith OSM MSA presented MEC Charles Olden with a much appreciated copy of our Heritage Book.

Calling Back the Past!

Freemasonry has a rich history and we often receive old pictures reminding us of this. The 1932 picture below, however, is particularly interesting. The Grand Master of the Grand East of the Netherlands, MW Bro Herman van Tongeren visited South Africa and gave addresses in all of the major centres. He was accompanied on his tour by RW Bro CC Silberbauer.

Silberbauer was the Deputy Grand Master National for South Africa for some 40 years and was responsible for establishing the Provincial Grand Lodge of the Transvaal and for opening a large number of new Lodges under the Grand East of the Netherlands. He was a respected lawywer in his private life. He was also a prolific Masonic writer and he and his brother, C "Fred" Silberbauer, wrote much Masonic material including some of the hymns we now include in our rituals, as well as 1st, 2nd and 3rd degree papers which are to be found in our Masonic Book of Life.

A book, "Addresses by H van Tongeren", was later compiled and can still be found in Masonic book collections today. After inhumane treatment by the Nazis, van Tongeren died in a Concentration Camp.
