

New Grand Master's Inaugural Address

The world in which we currently live is very different to that of 5 or 10 years ago, let alone the time when we were children. As a young adult and then a parent I was determined to avoid having a generation gap between myself and my children. I now have to grudgingly admit to my naivety. Reality is that the world is constantly changing and the rate of change is almost exponential. This is the world in which we as Freemasons live, where many good things of the past are being discarded for instant gratification, necessities are replaced by greed, and morality is all but scorned.

Have we, as Freemasons, changed accordingly? Why are the traditional institutions struggling for survival in our modern society? Our own membership numbers have steadily declined over the past 15 years, yet the very essence of our Order is good, sound, and relevant. The problem is that we have not been able to adapt to the rapid changes in the world around us and as an organisation reverse the trend of attrition.

At our Chains Conference in March, I asked our Brethren "If your Lodge were to cease to exist in the areas in which it operates, would it be missed?" The general consensus was "NO". A sad situation indeed, but we must ask why, and what we can do to mitigate this negative answer. We as the GLSA must be highly visible in society for all the right reasons. To achieve this, sacrifices must be made. Masonry must become fun again and this fun element combined with great visibility will surely attract many good men to join us.

As the oldest and largest fraternal organisation in the world today, we cannot complacently think that we will continue to survive for hundreds of years to come, purely on our legacy. No, survival means adapting to the constant changes in our world and societies in which we live. Yet we seem unable to make these changes, just as I proved unable to bridge the Generation Gap in my family. We simply must bridge this gap. No one can do this for us.

Yes, the World has changed and will continue to do so. Society has also changed. Small towns and villages are now shells of their former selves. Urbanisation is now the new society, we live in a sprawling mess, where the breakdown of the very fundamentals of common decency, respect of law and order and, more importantly, morality is very clear.

The world in which Freemasonry was practiced in the past has vanished and our challenge is to find ways to keep us relevant in society today. That clearly requires change from us, change which we have simply not brought about quickly enough. We cannot continue to do the same things over and over and expect a different outcome. Einstein described that as the first sign of lunacy. We must do things differently, without destroying the age-old traditions, landmarks and practices of the Order.

We determine our own destiny and cannot allow outside influences to distract us. Are we not proud to openly admit that we are active Freemasons? Far too few of us have our best friends as members of our Order, some openly admitting that they would be ashamed to introduce their friends into their Lodge. Instead of being ashamed of the very organisation to which they belong, they must ask themselves what they can do to change the situation. We are all accountable for our actions and destiny. The Lodge to which we belong is **our** community. We are fraternal Brothers and therefore collective action as a Lodge will render this argument null and void.

This introduces planning - an integral part of how any organisation operates. If we fail to plan, we are, by default, planning to fail. All the great plans and ideas garnered over the past years **MUST** now be implemented. Every member must know what the plan is, and the direction must be clear. There is no time for simply talking. We must now apply compounded action followed through with pig headed discipline and determination to ensure that we achieve our goal. Freemasonry must be demonstrable action.

We must show that we are men of conviction and that we are serious about our intentions. We need to demonstrate to society, that we are making the world we live in a better place for all.

At the same time, when formulating new plans, we must interact with the Brethren to promote inclusivity and not impose ill-conceived change on an unwilling audience, yet we must be mindful of being caught in the trap of hobbling change for the comfort of familiarity. Freemasonry is a way of life. We must all be excited about our Freemasonry.

Freemasonry must be a genuine family affair. We must involve our wives, partners and children in our projects within our communities and have them playing a role in the Grand Lodge vision. Imagine having our wives encouraging us to attend meetings, as they and their Masonic Friends have charitable tasks to attend to - **she** does not want to miss her meeting, because **she** will let **her** team down if **she** is not there. The combined activities of the Brethren and their families are an integral part of the great plan.

Steve Jobs said: "If you are working on something exciting that you really care about, you don't have to be pushed. The vision pulls you."

John Maxwell says "A great leader's <u>courage</u> to fulfil his vision comes from <u>passion</u>, not position." He also said: "The difference between Ordinary and Extraordinary is just a little Extra."

Let us all get out there and, using our various skills and talents, make a real difference and have an immense amount of fun while doing so.
