Mitigate Negative Behaviour and Foster Positivity

Maintaining a positive, constructive environment is crucial for promoting the well-being of our Order! Destructive behaviour and negativity hinder progress, demotivate members and ultimately undermines the organisation's goals. I hope that the points which follow will assist each and every one of us to stop destructive behaviour and reverse the negativity which has infiltrated in certain areas of our organisation.

1. Open Communication:

Effective communication is the foundation of any successful organisation. We encourage open dialogue among our members, allowing them to express their concerns, ideas, and suggestions. Our regular meetings should seek to foster a sense of community and ensure that everyone's voice is heard. This inclusivity will help prevent destructive behaviour and create an environment where negativity can be addressed constructively. Remember to play the problem and not the man. Respect is paramount in these deliberations.

2. Clear Expectations and Goals:

We have recently defined the GLSA's vision, mission and values. The setting of clear expectations, enables our members to have a sense of purpose and direction, thus minimising destructive behaviour. We must regularly revisit and communicate these goals to keep everyone aligned and motivated.

3. Collaboration and Teamwork:

A culture of collaboration and teamwork must exist within the Order. Members are encouraged to work together, share ideas, and support one another. This fosters an environment where members feel valued and appreciated for their contributions. Teamwork creates an environment where members will feel a sense of belonging and camaraderie, and negativity and destructive behaviour is minimised.

4. Training and Development Opportunities:

The Grand Lodge offers training and mentorship, sadly many members do not participate in these voluntary learning opportunities. We offer training sessions, to enhance the skills and knowledge of our members. We provide opportunities for growth for our members and participants in these programs feel valued and motivated, reducing the likelihood of destructive behaviour. We get to know ourselves better and learn to respect other's opinions and work towards attaining a common platform on which to go forward.

5. Conflict Resolution Strategies:

Conflict is inevitable in any organisation and must be addressed promptly and constructively. Our Order requests that when two or more members are in variance with each other, that the members involved resolve their differences outside of the Lodge. We encourage open dialogue, active listening and compromise. By resolving conflicts early on, a positive atmosphere can be maintained.

6. Recognise and Celebrate Achievements:

Our frenetic lives often mean that we fail to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements of individual members and the Order as a whole. We need to regularly recognise and reward exceptional contributions. By highlighting positive outcomes and successes, our members will feel appreciated.

7. A Supportive and Inclusive Environment:

Our Lodge environments should be ones where our members feel supported and included. We encourage diversity and respect for different perspectives and backgrounds. Our Order promotes inclusivity and will not tolerate discrimination. This is one of the core objectives of our Grand Lodge. By fostering such a supportive and inclusive environment, our members will feel safe and valued.

8. Lead by Example:

Leaders within the Order should exemplify the behaviour they expect from others. Not only must we demonstrate professionalism, respect, and positivity in all interactions, but we must act and live as though our very existence is dependent on doing so. As leaders of the Order, we must actively listen to our members, address concerns promptly, and provide constructive feedback. By leading by example, leaders can inspire Brethren to emulate their positive behaviour and contribute to a harmonious organisational culture.

Conclusion:

Stopping destructive behaviour and reversing negativity within our Order requires a proactive and

comprehensive approach. I undertook to listen more to our members. We are promoting open communication, setting clear expectations, encouraging collaboration. We provide training and mentoring opportunities, we want to recognise success rather than failures, in a supportive environment. This can only be achieved if we all lead by example. By so doing, we will all be working together to create a positive and constructive atmosphere. In this way we hope our members will feel motivated, engaged, and empowered to contribute their best, ultimately leading to the success and growth of our Order and specifically our Grand Lodge.
